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#### Wasting Ink By Jeff Folloder

A leftover bit of procedure continues to plague the NFA community. And anyone that has tried to perform a civilian transfer has to endure the ignominy of the dreaded "CLEO Signature" requirement of the Form 1 and Form 4. Long before there was a reliable communication system, before there was an Internet, before there was a NICS network, NFA Branch relied on a chief law enforcement officer to give tacit approval to a transfer by stating that he or she didn't know of any reason why it shouldn't happen. That was then.

Yet we now have all of those wonderful bits of reliable and effective communication and background checking capabilities. And we still have the anachronism of needing to curry favor with the Sheriff in order to lawfully transfer a weapon. And when the Sheriff cannot or will not place his or her signature on the Form,

civilians are forced to get "creative" through the use of trusts and corporate entities so that the signature requirement vanishes.

The NFATCA has been working for several years to make this ineffective and re-



dundant requirement go away. The FBI background check required for any Form 1 or Form 4 is far more reliable than the hope that the Sheriff or Police Chief knows the history of a given applicant. And NICS can confirm that the person who is actually taking possession of an NFA

item is even allowed to. But more importantly, eliminating CLEO Signature requirements would allow more people to exercise their absolute right to purchase and utilize NFA items and actually increase the number of background checks on NFA transfers to 100%!

Harris County (the metropolitan area comprising the city of Houston, Texas) has more than 4,000,000 residents and has never had a Sheriff (Democrat or Republican) that was willing to sign an NFA Form. The Sheriff's assistant, when asked, indicated that the Sheriff would rather not know that an NFA weapon was in his jurisdiction (as in a trust or corporate transfer) than risk the political accusation of supporting the "proliferation of machine guns". Isn't it time we finally nailed this issue down and pulled the signature requirement off the Forms for good?

#### When Does Size Matter?

When we are talking about the "size" of a bullet! The ATF's mission has always been to insure the safety of the public with regard to firearms and their associated ammunition. Given that this arena is ever-changing, the mission is both evolving and critical. The NFATCA is seeking to assist ATF in formulating an approach to regulating ammunition that removes the arbitrary nature of "single attribute" regulations such as caliber restrictions and employ an approach that encompasses a more realistic set of measurements. Clearly, a 40mm grenade launcher training round (powered by a .38 blank) is less of a threat to public safety than a .416 Rigby hunting round. Yet under proposed regulation, the hunting round is unfettered, while ownership of the "chalk" round would require licensing, secure storage and mandatory inspection.

With a limited amount of resources available to be deployed against the administrative needs of such a scheme, resources that would necessarily be removed from other current functions, it is in the best interests of ATF to administer the law in such a way that public safety is maintained without the inefficient addition of bureaucracy that ultimately serves to undermine this safety. The NFATCA is working with

several other prominent organizations such as the NRA, NSSF, and SAAMI to make sure that our members do not get swept up in unnecessary bureaucracy.

## Glock, It's So Easy...

...and can be so illegal for most! It is quite easy to modify a Glock pistol into a select fire or full-auto weapon. Parts and kits are available on the Internet, from mail order and at gun shows for what seems like a cheap price. So why not?

As long as you bear in mind that the ATF considers the conversion device a post-sample machine gun and that you must have the proper licenses and documentation to just have this, you should be fine. And given the general view of the meaning of "constructive intent," it

would be best to understand that just having all the parts under the same roof as a Glock might be an issue unless properly licensed. Okay. You likely understand that this is a severely restricted project with intense legal ramifications that should not, under any circumstances, be done by the average, law-abiding citizen.

If you do have one, though, watch out for that muzzle climb! 1,300 rounds per minute can get away from you pretty fast! #4: Know your target and what's behind it.
